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#### Dear Friends

At last spring is with us. The days are longer, the evenings are lighter and there is a feeling of optimism in the air.

At the time of writing, I am delighted to say that Israel is out of lockdown and so our sanctuary is once again open to visitors. The West Bank is sadly in a more difficult position but Dr Rakan and his team are holding as many clinics as they can to help the donkeys, mules and horses.

We are delighted to report that, subject to covid restrictions, we have an event scheduled for 2021, our first since the end of 2019! Our supporter and very talented artist Anton Ratnayake will be holding an art exhibition in London – please see the back page of this newsletter for more details. Hope was born at the sanctuary on 23 December 2017 to Rita, rescued from the side of a busy highway. Sadly, Rita has since passed away but Hope has formed a strong bond with another donkey of about her age, Yalon, and the two are inseparable.

Rescued: 2007

Murphy was rescued after being beaten mercilessly with electric cable. He was so badly injured that one eye had to be removed but went on to recover and has been living happily at the sanctuary ever since.

Rescued: 2002

Lily was rescued 19 years ago from a rubbish dump where she was foraging for food. She had been the target of abuse by a gang of youths who had cruelly chopped her ears off.




#### Donkeys on film





Menachem enjoyed his visit so much that he adopted a donkey and has promised to come back and see us again soon.




#### Weighing scales

Like many of us, some of our donkeys have put on a bit of weight over the last year during lockdown. Equally, if a donkey loses weight, it may be a sign of illness. We have now got our very own weighing scales at the sanctuary so that each donkey can be checked regularly to ensure the herd remains in tip-top condition.



#### **Carrots for all**

Although as mentioned above, the donkeys' weight is carefully monitored, everyone likes a treat now and then and the donkeys are no different. Earlier in the spring, a lovely lady called Gali from nearby Moshav Chavar Lat (a moshav is an agricultural village) visited the sanctuary to donate a large quantity of carrots that were left over after picking them for sale. ## Goodbye to Stevenson...



Stevenson had been at the sanctuary since 2002, when he was rescued from being sent to be made into sausages. Sadly, his health failed him recently and the vet decided that the kindest thing to do would be to put him to sleep. Stevenson passed away peacefully after nearly 20 years of love and care, surrounded by his donkey and human friends. RIP Stevenson, you will not be forgotten.

#### ...hello to Edo

Five year old Edo came to us in March 2021. A kind lady named Jasmine found him in a town in the north of Israel where he was being abused by a gang of youths. Thankfully Jasmine knew of our work and called us to take the donkey in. She asked if we would call the donkey Edo in memory of her son who had sadly passed away and we were happy to agree. Welcome to our donkey family Edo.





As I write, the West Bank is still on lockdown so Nour, Wael and I have not been able to carry out as many mobile clinics as we would like. However, we are still allowed to travel to some areas and are doing as much as we can, as well as helping owners by video call.

Many of the owners are too poor to pay for a vet even if they could find one that would visit to offer treatment. This is where our team is a lifeline for the donkeys and their owners. Meet 'Beauty', a loyal and hardworking donkey whose job is to carry goods for her owner and act as shepherd for his sheep flock. This she could do in relative safety in the mountains but when her owner moved the sheep to a different area nearer a town, stray dogs attacked the flock despite her heroic efforts to defend them. The sheep ran, Beauty ran and she fell into a deep gulley sustaining painful injuries. The farmer contacted me and when I visited, I found the donkey suffering shock as well as the physical wounds. Thankfully I was able to save her and visited a month later to check on Beauty who was by now well enough to undergo much needed dental work and treatment for worms and talk to the farmer about the importance of this sort of routine care. One happy donkey, one happy and better informed owner. Nobody can ever evaluate the happiness of that farmer except us when we saw him wrap his arms around her neck with a big smile.










A few weeks ago, I was asked to look at a donkey which had been found wandering the streets of Nablus. In the past, a nylon rope had obviously been used as a head collar and this had become embedded into the donkey's muzzle, causing terrible wounds. It had cut all the way through the donkey's skin and flesh to the bone – the photos are so distressing that I cannot show you here. I checked the donkey over and apart from his wounds, he seemed healthy and in good condition so I decided to see what I could do to help. I gave the donkey anaesthetic and painkillers, tidied up the wounds and sutured them. Over the next few weeks, the donkey had several operations and is now well on the way to recovery. It is hoped that he will eventually be able to go back to the kind man who rescued him.

Whether by deliberate cruelty or terrifying accidents like these, the suffering for a donkey, mule or horse is the same – we treat all cases by bringing relief to the

animals and some timely education for their owners. This is what Safe Haven for Donkeys is all about – changing the country donkey by donkey.

One example is this horse which was an undernourished foal when I encountered him on one of my visits to a town in the north of the West Bank. Recently, I went back to the same town and the proud owner brought the horse, now all grown up, to see me. The owner has been looking after his animals well, thanks to the advice and support I gave him.



#### As usual, we have some new arrivals to our clinic in Nablus...



Salwa was found as a strav wandering the streets of Bethlehem by Nariman Kiriaco. Nariman took her to her aunt Rose's property but Rose was unable to cope with looking after her and felt that Salwa's living conditions were not suitable. Salwa was also lonely without any other donkeys to keep her company. Rose contacted Safe Haven for Donkeys and we were able to transport Salwa to our Nablus clinic – she arrived on 21st February 2021 and has already settled in and made new friends. Thank you Nariman and Rose for caring for Salwa.



Ten year old Donnie arrived at our Nablus clinic a few weeks ago. A man brought him to us - he had found an abandoned donkey in the streets of a village to the south of Jericho with a strange "twisted" leg. He had been told by local people that the donkey, which had no owner, had been hit but a car. He rescued him and tried to treat him with antibiotics and wound ointment. He took a photo with his phone and came to our Nablus clinic, trying to describe the donkey's condition. It turned out to be a broken part of the femur which meant that the donkey could survive but would not be able to work again. We convinced the man to bring the donkey to the shelter so that he could live the rest of his life in peace. The next week, the man brought the donkey and after a general check-up, he was vaccinated and castrated. He then joined the other donkeys at the clinic.

#### Rest in peace Frankie and Clara

You may remember that in the last newsletter I told you about Frankie, a new arrival with a growth on his leg. Frankie was in his 40s which is incredibly old for a donkey and sadly, his general health deteriorated until I felt it would be best to put him painlessly to sleep.

Clara, who had been with us for some time, was also quite elderly and again, her general health deteriorated and she eventually passed away. It is always sad to lose one of the donkeys but we will never forget any of them and will carry on our vital work in memory of them all.

In our last newsletter, we told you all about our new project in the Hebron/Bethlehem area. Sadly, Dr Eyad Naser and farrier Saleh Jaber have not yet been able to start treating donkeys in the area - the area is one of the worst in the West Bank for covid cases and is still on full lockdown. However, they have both completed additional training with our team in Nablus and are ready to get started as soon as they are allowed. Thank you so much to the Petplan Charitable Trust for their donation of £4,500 towards this project and also Jodi who has made a substantial gift in memory of her uncle Bud. As soon as we can, we will be putting your money to good use.

#### Gift Aid

The Gift Aid scheme allows charities to reclaim tax on donations received from supporters who have paid sufficient income or capital gains tax during the year to cover the amount we would be reclaiming from HMRC. #### DATA PROTECTION & PRIVACY

In carrying out our day to day activities Safe Haven for Donkeys in the Holy Land processes and stores personal information relating to our supporters and we are therefore required to adhere to the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation and other relevant Acts and Regulations. We take our responsibilities very seriously and we ensure the personal information we obtain is held, used, transferred and otherwise processed in accordance with that Regulation and all other applicable data protection laws and regulations including, but not limited to, the Privacy and Electronic Communication Regulations.

Personal information we might collect includes your name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, date of birth, whether you are a tax payer (for Gift Aid purposes), bank account details if you set up a regular payment, donations you have made or events in which you have participated. On occasion, we may need to look up your telephone number in the phone book to contact you regarding a donation you have made - we would then store this data in our database in case it is needed for the same purpose in the future.

We collect this data for purposes including the processing of any donation made by you, to provide you with any products or information you have requested or for internal record keeping/accounting/administration. Having supported us, under the "legitimate interest" condition for processing data we believe that you would like to receive our quarterly newsletter and occasional additional appeals or updates on our work and so we will also use your details for this purpose.

If you use your credit or debit card to donate to us, buy something or pay online or over the phone, we will ensure that this is done securely and in accordance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard. All card details and validation codes are securely destroyed once the payment or donation has been processed. Other information will be held as long as is reasonably necessary to allow us to continue to communicate with you or to comply with relevant legislation. For example, the HMRC require Gift Aid declarations to be retained indefinitely.

We will not sell, share or swap your information with any third parties unless required to do so for legal reasons (for example to the police). We do send the names and addresses of our supporters to the printers who produce our quarterly newsletter. They also comply with the General Data Protection Regulation and use your details solely for the purpose of mailing the newsletter. They do not retain the data or use it for any other purpose.

It is your choice on the type of communications and information you receive about our charity and the ways in which you can get involved. You can change your mind at any time by contacting us by post, e-mail or phone using the contact details on page two of this newsletter. If you have a complaint about how your data is processed, please contact us in the first instance. If we cannot resolve the situation, you have the right to complain to the Information Commissioner's Office. You also have the right to request copies of any data held about you and to request rectification of any inaccuracies.
