

We are looking into whether we could solve the winter flooding issues at the current site and if so, with the extra room, staying put would certainly be a possibility. We will keep you posted.

We were delighted to welcome a new member of our donkey family in March – three-year-old Rafa was found wandering in a field by a very kind lady who brought him to our sanctuary. He is healthy and has settled down well with the other donkeys.






Elderly Ed

Ed the tractor is a vital member of our team, moving hay from one part of the site to the other and scooping up muck. Without Ed, we would probably need to double the number of workers at the sanctuary but he is now getting rather elderly and it is proving extremely difficult to find the parts he needs. We will soon need to retire him and replace him with a brand-new tractor which will be a very expensive but necessary purchase to ensure the donkeys can be well looked after.

DID YOU KNOW? It takes 320 tons of hay a year to feed the donkeys at our sanctuary and each ton is about £238. That's over £76,000 just to feed the donkeys. Your donations literally put food in our donkeys' mouths – thank you so much for your support.


Anna Harrison, our volunteer veterinary advisor writes...



The best cure for covid!

Well – almost two years to the day since my last visit to Safe Haven and the world has become a different place. The travel arrangements were planned meticulouslynot by me I hasten to add - but, oh so much in the way of paperwork and health checks, I was wondering if it would all be worth it. And then I spotted the first of many donkeys and I knew it absolutely was! There are no words to explain the calmly tranquil aura that envelopes this very special sanctuary.

Compared with some other equine charities it is a very humble place but it offers unrivalled care by the small, dedicated team and it's clear that funds are directed towards donkey care and welfare rather than plush buildings which is exactly as it should be. It was a real pleasure to meet Tarek and Ali who have both got a serious case of the donkey bug and join our wonderful Moussa in the daily care of the donkeys. They are masters of all trades, from mucking out, poo picking, grooming, building maintenance and so much more. And Dusty brings the sanctuary to life for the visitors who are now starting to return.



I hope you may be interested in a catch up of a few of the donkeys:

I've known Anna since before she was born – Gali was heavily pregnant when I first visited in early July 2019 and Anna was born later that month. She was a gorgeous foal when I first met her in February 2020 and has grown into a stunningly

beautiful girl, every bit as good looking as her mum and older brother, Yalon. Never having known any fear or abuse she is a happy and confident donkey and adored by all the visitors who she plays to shamelessly. If you've got it, flaunt it is her strategy! She's never far away from Gali who still puts her in her place when she acts a bit too much like a diva!

Yalon and Hope are still close buddies and woe betide anyone who tries to come between them. They're a wonderful example of the close bonds that can form between donkeys.





And then there is Litchi (Lychee). Rescued in the Negev Desert, having been found with a horrendous neck wound caused by a tight rope that was deeply embedded, we can only guess at her history. Whether she was abandoned or

escaped is not known but what I can be sure of is that she is in the very best place and, thanks to intensive care by the local vet and sanctuary staff, the wound is looking so much better. She is a sweet and gentle old donkey and is learning to trust and even enjoy her new life in the best of company (other donkeys) and with all the love she can handle. I suspect she has never had any dental care before and her teeth were found to be in a very poor state. Any of you who keep donkeys will know how vitally important it is to have their teeth professionally examined at least once a year.



A visit to see Dr Rakan at his Nablus clinic is always inspiring. He veers from being the complete professional – offering the best of treatment to desperately needy animals to being a serial donkey hugger when with his own 'babies'! He only has to call and they come running. Kay is growing into a beautiful young lady and Pen is completely adorable and very cheeky.

While the donkeys Dr Rakan cares for are safe with plentiful food and affection, they really need more

space and the big dream for this year is to try and find a new site with more space where these wonderful young donkeys can run and play to their hearts' content.

If you're reading this, the chances are you are a supporter of this fabulous small charity. So, a big thank you from me and please know that your support is very much appreciated and we cannot do what we do without you.



Postscript... Despite the very best of care dear Lychee was finding it more and more difficult to eat and maintain a healthy bodyweight because of her loss of multiple teeth. For us the loss of a tooth or two is no big deal for but equids it is life shortening - do have a look at the educational videos on the Safe Haven website (under publications) if you want to know more. When her quality of life started to fail, she was gently put to sleep surrounded by those who loved her. It is absolutely our responsibility to give these precious donkeys the best life for as long as we can but to recognise when the time is right to give them a peaceful end.

Dr Rakan's Palestinian donkey stories

Firstly, a heartfelt "thank you" to everyone who donated to our special appeal to equip my colleague Dr Eyed Nasser's mobile clinic in the south of the West Bank.

Dr Eyed started running this mobile clinic with his farrier Ahmad in the Bethlehem/Hebron area last year as it is difficult for Nour, Wael and I to cover the whole country on our own. He soon realised just how many animals desperately needing help there are in that region so the clinic increased from one to two days a week and we plan to increase still further.

Dr Eyed has been using his own vehicle and equipment since he began but he desperately needed a better vehicle and more up to date equipment such as an electric tooth rasper and a portable ultrasound machine.

Thanks to your generosity, we have started to buy some of the items Dr Eyed needs and I hope that in the next newsletter, I will be able to show you photos of a fully equipped Hebron team in action.

In the meantime, Dr Eyed will be visiting me at the Nablus clinic in the near future to receive some additional specialised training.





Recently, a little horse was brought into the clinic by a man who had just bought her for his grandchild. It was obvious that the horse had been badly neglected by her previous owner and I immediately set up an IV drip to fix her severe dehydration. I also dewormed her and gave her oral vitamins and rasped her teeth – I am pleased to say that by the time she left the clinic, she was already looking and feeling so much better.




This young donkey was also brought to the clinic by his concerned owner – the foal had been grazing with a flock of sheep but had slipped and fallen onto some sharp rocks, resulting in a nasty wound. I cleaned and disinfected the wound, dressed it and covered it to protect from flies.

I am so pleased that word is spreading about our work and owners now know to bring their animals to me if they need help. We have not had any new rescues since I last wrote but I have been busy looking after the 30 or so resident donkeys at the Nablus clinic. The youngsters, including Pen, Geoffrey and Katie, are growing and all the donkeys are thriving.

You may remember that in the last newsletter, I mentioned that we are looking for a new and bigger site for the donkeys as the Nablus facility was only ever intended to be a clinic/hospital, not a sanctuary. I have not yet found anywhere suitable – the search is continuing and I will update you when I have more news. It would be so lovely for the donkeys to have more room but it must be the right location and we will need someone to stay overnight with them to make sure they are secure.

Gift Aid



DATA PROTECTION & PRIVACY

In carrying out our day to day activities Safe Haven for Donkeys in the Holy Land processes and stores personal information relating to our supporters and we are therefore required to adhere to the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation and other relevant Acts and Regulations. We take our responsibilities very seriously and we ensure the personal information we obtain is held, used, transferred and otherwise processed in accordance with that Regulation and all other applicable data protection laws and regulations including, but not limited to, the Privacy and Electronic Communication Regulations.

Personal information we might collect includes your name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, date of birth, whether you are a tax payer (for Gift Aid purposes), bank account details if you set up a regular payment, donations you have made or events in which you have participated. On occasion, we may need to look up your telephone number in the phone book to contact you regarding a donation you have made - we would then store this data in our database in case it is needed for the same purpose in the future.

We collect this data for purposes including the processing of any donation made by you, to provide you with any products or information you have requested or for internal record keeping/accounting/administration. Having supported us, under the "legitimate interest" condition for processing data we believe that you would like to receive our quarterly newsletter and occasional additional appeals or updates on our work and so we will also use your details for this purpose.

If you use your credit or debit card to donate to us, buy something or pay online or over the phone, we will ensure that this is done securely and in accordance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard. All card details and validation codes are securely destroyed once the payment or donation has been processed. Other information will be held as long as is reasonably necessary to allow us to continue to communicate with you or to comply with relevant legislation. For example, the HMRC require Gift Aid declarations to be retained indefinitely.

We will not sell, share or swap your information with any third parties unless required to do so for legal reasons (for example to the police). We do send the names and addresses of our supporters to the printers who produce our quarterly newsletter. They also comply with the General Data Protection Regulation and use your details solely for the purpose of mailing the newsletter. They do not retain the data or use it for any other purpose.

It is your choice on the type of communications and information you receive about our charity and the ways in which you can get involved. You can change your mind at any time by contacting us by post, e-mail or phone using the contact details on page two of this newsletter. If you have a complaint about how your data is processed, please contact us in the first instance. If we cannot resolve the situation, you have the right to complain to the Information Commissioner's Office. You also have the right to request copies of any data held about you and to request rectification of any inaccuracies.
