Name: Alby

Age: 11 years

Rescued: September 2012

Alby came to our sanctuary in Israel from the West Bank, where he was the subject of abuse due to having a damaged ear. The ear has since much improved in our care and you would never know there had been anything wrong.



Name: Dusty

10 years Age:

Rescued: October 2013

Dusty was just 4 weeks old when he was found wandering the streets of the West Bank town of Qalqilya. He was brought to our sanctuary in Israel, where he had to be bottle-fed.



Name: **Mistletoe**

Age: 13 years

Rescued: December 2011

Mistletoe was found abandoned at the donkey market in the West Bank city of Nablus, along with her foal and another orphan foal. The three were taken to our sanctuary in Israel and Mistletoe "adopted" the orphan, feeding him alongside her own foal.

What goes on during an average day at the sanctuary?

Housekeeping

As you can imagine, so many donkeys create a lot of mess. Every day starts with scraping the sanctuary clean and piling up the poop, which is taken away to be treated and re-used as fertiliser. Nothing is wasted!

The staff also fill the feeders up with straw, including specially chopped straw for the oldies who have trouble eating. We were spending about £2,000 a month on this "short chop straw" but thanks to the generosity of the Elise Pilkington Charitable Trust, we were able to purchase a shredding machine which does the chopping for us.

Moussa and Ali check the donkeys every day, cleaning out hooves, wiping eyes and giving special treatment to donkeys such as Burnie, who has to have cream applied daily.

Our vet, Dr Eliran, visits regularly to look after the donkeys – he checks a different group each week, looking at their teeth, hooves and general body condition. He is then able to carry out any treatment needed to make sure each donkey is in the best health they can possibly be.

How do you keep 180 donkeys entertained?


Donkeys are intelligent animals and enjoy stimulation. This is why our main paddock has piles of earth in it – our donkeys love climbing up and exploring these.


They are also regularly offered branches to chew on and have fun with and Moussa, Ali and the team also give tasty treats such as carrots and watermelon.

RIP Elijah, you will not be forgotten.






Nader is Growing

News from Egypt

Welcome To Our New Egypt Team

Firstly, a huge thank you to our supporters. In our last mailing, we asked you to help us fund the first year of our new project in Egypt, the first time we had expanded into another country and you responded magnificently! At the time of writing, we have raised over £65,000. Thanks to you, we have already been able to begin helping brick kiln donkeys in desperate need.





We would now like to introduce you to the members of our team and show you how your donations are already making a real difference to donkeys' lives.

Dr Shaaban graduated from the University of Cairo in 2001. In 2018 he received a Masters in Equine Surgery and in 2020, he undertook an internship at the Equine Performance Innovative Centre in Ocala, Florida.

He is helped by Hamed and Moharram, both farriers (Moharram is also a former brick kiln owner). The team work in the brick kilns 6 days a week, dealing with immediate, fixable problems, bringing instant relief to animals that have been in pain. However, we know that is not enough and the team will also bring long-term benefits through education, thereby avoiding further injuries and hoof issues.

An example of the animals the team have already helped is this poor donkey which was in a cart accident and had a severe lacerated wound in his hind leg. He was new to the kiln and was about 6 years old. His owner called him "the little one" as he is smaller than the other donkeys in the kiln. Cart accidents are common in the brick kilns so we are working with the donkey owners and others in the brick kiln to reduce the frequency of accidents by training on their correct and safe use.

This donkey had been working in the brick kilns for about 4 years and had gone lame due to a hoof abscess. His owner had tried to help him by making a bandage out of old clothes and plastic bags but it did not work. The team treated the donkey by hoof trimming, draining the abscess, bandaging, keeping the hoof clean,

giving him antibiotics and anti-inflammatories, most importantly encouraging the owner to regularly clean the stable. If stables are dirty/muddy, donkeys are more prone to hoof abscesses and thrush so we plan to assess the stables in the kilns and establish cleaning routines as part of an action plan to improve the quality of life for the donkeys.

Dr Shabaan tells us that, other than our team, the donkey owners have no other access to veterinary care for their donkeys as vets will not come to the brick kilns due to the harsh environment. The owners are so very grateful that Safe Haven's team are helping their animals and are very keen to learn and to improve animal welfare in the kilns.



There are no other charities working in the brick kilns of the El Saf region of Egypt and it is thanks to you that we are able to help these donkeys – thank you from the bottom of our hearts.





Dr Rakan's Palestinian donkey stories

In the last newsletter, I mentioned to you that alongside my team with Wael and Nour in the northern part of the West Bank and Dr Eyed and Ahmad in the south, thanks to your generosity we had been able to set up a third mobile clinic in the centre of the country, run by Dr Omran and farrier Ali.

My team is on the road every day, travelling hundreds of miles across the West Bank, looking for more and more of those poor donkeys, mules and horses. We help them as much as we can and provide our best services in every single location we reach.

We do our best to meet our animal welfare goals as a humane organisation which treats and protects those poor working animals. With our services which we provide to the farmers and animals, we raise the standard of living for so many neglected animals.

However, Nour, Wael and I cannot cover all of the West Bank alone, especially as some areas are extremely isolated and we are so delighted to be working alongside our Hebron and Jordan Valley teams, caring for so many animals and providing advice and education for their owners.

A few weeks ago, we held one of our busiest ever clinics in the village of Kefl Harith. I had visited that village before and not many animals. This time, we had nearly 100! The owners told me they had heard from the



nearby villages about our work and how we replace head collars, provide dewormers and other medicines, about our hoof trimming and teeth rasping and that we have a new ultrasound machine. Word spread and the owners encouraged one another to bring their animals along, even staying off work that day so they could come. Each and every owner was so very grateful for our help and of course we will visit again.

Since our last newsletter, we have had a new arrival at the Nablus clinic, who we have named Jan after our newest Patron Jan Leeming.





I first met Jan the donkey in the Balata Refugee Camp on the outskirts of Nablus. She had a terrible wound on her rump where she had been pierced by a sharp piece of metal. I persuaded her owner to let me take her to our clinic for treatment. After draining the wound which had by this time formed an abscess, every day I gave Jan painkillers and antibiotics and applied ointments. The treatment took weeks and her owner eventually decided he didn't want Jan back. Jan is now living with the 30 or so donkeys at our Nablus clinic.

As you know, we have for some time been looking for a new site for the donkeys which currently call our Nablus clinic home. There is just not enough room in the clinic for so many animals and think we have finally found a site in the Jenin region of the West Bank. Many of you may have seen Jenin in the news but the site is far away from the city and the donkeys will be quite safe – they will also have someone to look after them and I will visit regularly. I hope to have more news on this soon.

Thank you for your generous support which allows all this work to happen.

DATA PROTECTION & PRIVACY

In carrying out our day to day activities Safe Haven for Donkeys in the Holy Land processes and stores personal information relating to our supporters and we are therefore required to adhere to the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation and other relevant Acts and Regulations. We take our responsibilities very seriously and we ensure the personal information we obtain is held, used, transferred and otherwise processed in accordance with that Regulation and all other applicable data protection laws and regulations including, but not limited to, the Privacy and Electronic Communication Regulations.

Personal information we might collect includes your name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, date of birth, whether you are a tax payer (for Gift Aid purposes), bank account details if you set up a regular payment, donations you have made or events in which you have participated. On occasion, we may need to look up your telephone number in the phone book to contact you regarding a donation you have made - we would then store this data in our database in case it is needed for the same purpose in the future.

We collect this data for purposes including the processing of any donation made by you, to provide you with any products or information you have requested or for internal record keeping/accounting/administration. Having supported us, under the "legitimate interest" condition for processing data we believe that you would like to receive our quarterly newsletter and occasional additional appeals or updates on our work and so we will also use your details for this purpose.

If you use your credit or debit card to donate to us, buy something or pay online or over the phone, we will ensure that this is done securely and in accordance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard. All card details and validation codes are securely destroyed once the payment or donation has been processed. Other information will be held as long as is reasonably necessary to allow us to continue to communicate with you or to comply with relevant legislation. For example, the HMRC require Gift Aid declarations to be retained indefinitely.

We will not sell, share or swap your information with any third parties unless required to do so for legal reasons (for example to the police). We do send the names and addresses of our supporters to the printers who produce our quarterly newsletter. They also comply with the General Data Protection Regulation and use your details solely for the purpose of mailing the newsletter. They do not retain the data or use it for any other purpose.

It is your choice on the type of communications and information you receive about our charity and the ways in which you can get involved. You can change your mind at any time by contacting us by post, e-mail or phone using the contact details on page two of this newsletter. If you have a complaint about how your data is processed, please contact us in the first instance. If we cannot resolve the situation, you have the right to complain to the Information Commissioner's Office. You also have the right to request copies of any data held about you and to request rectification of any inaccuracies.


