Dear Friends,

The last few months have been incredibly busy for our charity. As you will see later in this newsletter, we have had new rescues both in Israel and the West Bank, a new home for our West Bank donkeys and our teams in the West Bank and the El Saf brick kilns of Egypt have continued to improve the lives of hundreds of working animals.

Many of you have been asking about the donkeys in Gaza and if anything is being done to help them. We had been trying to get into Gaza for years but even in peaceful times it was impossible. We have however been made aware of a small charity called Sulala operating in Gaza itself to try and help the animals. They are desperately short of food and medication and so at the time of writing, we are investigating ways that, with the help of Animals Australia and organisations on the ground in Egypt, we might be able to get aid into Gaza. We don't know at this stage if it will be possible – we will keep you updated.

In the meantime, we hope you enjoy reading our updates in this newsletter.

These are uncertain times in the Middle East and everyone in the UK would like to pay tribute to our colleagues in Israel, the West Bank and Egypt. We are humbled by the way that they continue their work for the animals. Of course, this is only possible thanks to every single one of you and we would like to thank you all for your support.

Visit to Israel

Dr Anna Harrison, our volunteer veterinary advisor writes...


Last September saw Andy and I off to visit the donkeys again and I thought you would like an update on a few of your favourites. We were lucky enough to be staying in the little wooden cabins right by the main paddock and the view is nothing less than heart-stoppingly panoramic – wall to wall donkeys! It never ceases to amaze me how 170 donkeys live so peacefully together and it's a lesson for humanity that living in harmony is very good for the soul.

If all this sounds completely idyllic (it is!) let me tell you our first job is to drag our luggage across the paddock and we always try to do this quietly in the hope we can get them to the safety of the cabins before the donkeys spot us. And it never works! One donkey spots us and tells the whole herd within seconds. And soon we are gently surrounded by lots of soft, whiskery muzzles and glorious ears. Luggage tags seem to be the prizes worth barging for and all baggage is inspected more thoroughly than at the airport!

Burnie is loving the outdoor life. He is just the friendliest boy and is one of the first to greet us. His pure black velvet muzzle is eminently snoggable. The team tell me that Burnie really took young Dominic under his furry wing when he was first integrated into the main herd. You may remember Dominic was such a frail, frightened little colt when first rescued and it was touch and go for several days as he found it so hard to eat with his badly ulcerated mouth. With all the loving care he received he is now thriving and one of the boys enjoying life in the main herd.

And **Hope** and **Nader**? What a wonderful mother this young donkey turned out to be – fiercely protective of her son but gradually learning to let go now they are living with the smaller group of donkeys. This pair are unique at the sanctuary in that both were born there and so have had no sad life experiences. I wish I could say that about all the other donkeys many of whom bare the legacy scars of a previous traumatic life.

Nader was a shy baby when I first met him earlier in the year but now he is a really cheeky chappie. He has learnt many vital donkey life skills – he can buck, he can rush around in circles for no apparent reason, he can steal from pockets before you even know it and he can look you straight in the eye to make your heart melt. At the time of writing he is yet to be ready for castration











but, once that is done, he and Hope can join the main herd and he can grow up in the company of many other young donkeys. At the time, I wondered if he would stay bonded to his mum or find a new buddy. In November, we rescued another little foal, **Be'eri**, from a kibbutz in the south of Israel where he was found wandering the streets. Be'eri is a beautiful white foal and he and Nader took to each other like little white donkeys do. They can grow together in safety, surrounded by donkeys and people who love them.

And so to the West Bank where dear **Jan** is doing so well now. She is sweetly pretty and quite shy but absolutely loves her ears being rubbed. And she has two ears to be rubbed – not so for our brave new donkey – **Rakan**. I'm sure you saw the distressing pictures of this brave boy with life-changing cruel damage to his ear resulting in epic, life-saving surgery carried out by our fabulous Dr Rakan. Donkey Rakan is now a happy chap and will soon be integrated into the little herd that Dr Rakan lavishes so much love and care on. Rakan is believed to be over 20 and would have spent a lifetime working hard for somebody and it is difficult

to understand how such cruelty could be inflicted on a loyal and gentle animal. Thank goodness Safe Haven was there to help him. And thank goodness you are there to support Safe Haven in its vital work.

And then we had a very exciting visit with not a donkey in sight (at the time!). Dr Rakan's tiny shelter offers safety and comfort but it is simply not big enough to let the donkeys run and play and, of course, many of his donkeys are young and really need to be able to exercise. We visited a possible site for a new rescue centre and it looked nothing short of amazing. By the time you read this, our precious donkeys will be settled there, running free which will greatly enhance their lives and that's what Safe Haven is all about.

As I write this Safe Haven are working in a war zone. Yet still they work, with their amazing skill and dedication. Our small team comprises wonderful individuals of both Jewish and Muslim heritage. They don't let religious or cultural differences get in the way of giving as many donkeys the best life possible and that is a lesson for humanity and that is the magic of donkeys.

Firstly, I would like to thank each and every person who made a donation towards our new rescue centre in the West Bank village of Arrana.


Several of the donkeys that were living at our Nablus clinic were transported to Arrana in December and they are loving their new home. They have so much more space to run around and play and of course food and love from their very own carer, our new team member Mahmoud. I do miss having them at Nablus with me but I will be visiting regularly to check on them. It is only thanks to your generosity that our West Bank donkeys have this wonderful new home and we are all so grateful.

A few weeks ago, I was made aware of 13 donkeys that needed our help. Their owner, an American Palestinian, had previously rescued them but had to return to the USA and was no longer able to care for them. I immediately made arrangements to bring them to our clinic in Nablus for quarantine and vaccinations. By the time you read this, they should all have joined their new friends in Arrana and we will have more photos for you in the next newsletter.



Two donkeys who are still at Nablus as I write are Jan and Rakan. As you will have seen in the last newsletter, Jan the donkey, named after our Patron Jan Leeming had come to us from the Balata refugee camp. Unwanted by her owner, she had many terrible wounds and it took me some time to restored her health. She and Rakan, the one-eared donkey, will stay at the Nablus clinic for a while until they no longer need daily treatment. It is likely the hearing on that side of Rakan's head is muffled but otherwise, he is healthy and already becoming much more friendly and loving.

Of course, it is not just the donkeys at Nablus and Arrana that we care for in the West Bank. Every day, Wael, Nour and I and our two teams in the centre and south of the country are visiting different towns and villages to bring improvements to the lives of so



many suffering donkeys, mules and horses. As you can imagine, at the moment travel is not always easy but we are doing all we can to help those that need us.

Recently, we held a special education session for children in one of the towns. I gave a talk about animal welfare and gave out booklets. Some of those children understood my speech. They heard me very well, they listened to every single word I said. And I really hope I could reach their hearts in my talk. I wish I have the power to be able to influence them by touching their hearts. And to build a community with good behaviour toward animals and a good generation of new owners who are caring about their animals. One day, it is my hope that our charity will no longer be needed because all owners love and care for their donkeys.

I would just like to end by saying, a huge "thank you" to everyone who voted for me in the Worldwide Vets "Golden Star Awards". There were dozens of nominations of veterinary professionals all around the world going the extra mile to help animals in desperate need and I was honoured to come runner up. In these difficult times, it means so much to know there are people who care about our work.

Thank you for your generous support which allows all this work in the West Bank to happen.





News from Egypt

Dr Shabaan, our veterinary surgeon in Egypt writes...

It is now almost a year since the Safe Haven for Donkeys team of Moharram, Hamed and myself began working in the brick kilns of El Saf and thanks to you, we have already been able to transform the lives of so many donkeys through the provision of treatment of the donkeys and advice and support to the handlers and brick kiln owners. This is however just the beginning – we are visiting more and more kilns and in 2024 and beyond, we plan to increase our education work and train additional farriers, alongside treating as many animals as we possibly can.

In the last quarter of 2023, we were delighted to welcome one of Safe Haven's Patrons, actor and animal activist Peter Egan, along with Safe Haven CEO Andy Foxcroft, to see our work.

It was a very dramatic visit as no sooner had Peter arrived in one of the brick kilns, he was confronted with a distressing sight. A donkey had collapsed due to

colic and for a moment, everyone thought he was dead. As soon as I realised the donkey was still alive, I got the other team members to help me to get the animal standing up and inserted a saline drip, to which he added anti-inflammatory drugs, vitamins and minerals. While about 4 to 5 litres of fluid were being fed into the donkey through his veins, we checked the donkey's teeth, as food that is not properly digested can often be the cause of colic. Sure enough, the teeth needed urgent dental work and by the time treatment had finished, the donkey was clearly much more comfortable and standing calmly munching on some fresh fodder.

At the end of his visit, Peter told us that although he felt very sad for the animals and people toiling in such a harsh environment, he was also optimistic that with our team's help and your support, the future will be much brighter for the donkeys of the El Saf brick kilns and beyond. Thank you to Peter and to you all.

Rakan, named after his rescuer our star vet Dr Rakan, came to our clinic in Nablus as someone had set fire to his ear. Sadly, the ear was so badly burned that Dr Rakan had no option but to amputate. Although it is likely that Rakan's hearing is impaired on that side, he seems totally used to life with one ear already and has settled down well with his new donkey friends.

DATA PROTECTION & PRIVACY

In carrying out our day to day activities Safe Haven for Donkeys in the Holy Land processes and stores personal information relating to our supporters and we are therefore required to adhere to the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation and other relevant Acts and Regulations. We take our responsibilities very seriously and we ensure the personal information we obtain is held, used, transferred and otherwise processed in accordance with that Regulation and all other applicable data protection laws and regulations including, but not limited to, the Privacy and Electronic Communication Regulations.

Personal information we might collect includes your name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, date of birth, whether you are a tax payer (for Gift Aid purposes), bank account details if you set up a regular payment, donations you have made or events in which you have participated. On occasion, we may need to look up your telephone number in the phone book to contact you regarding a donation you have made – we would then store this data in our database in case it is needed for the same purpose in the future.

We collect this data for purposes including the processing of any donation made by you, to provide you with any products or information you have requested or for internal record keeping/accounting/administration. Having supported us, under the "legitimate interest" condition for processing data we believe that you would like to receive our quarterly newsletter and occasional additional appeals or updates on our work and so we will also use your details for this purpose.

If you use your credit or debit card to donate to us, buy something or pay online or over the phone, we will ensure that this is done securely and in accordance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard. All card details and validation codes are securely destroyed once the payment or donation has been processed. Other information will be held as long as is reasonably necessary to allow us to continue to communicate with you or to comply with relevant legislation. For example, the HMRC require Gift Aid declarations to be retained indefinitely.

We will not sell, share or swap your information with any third parties unless required to do so for legal reasons (for example to the police). We do send the names and addresses of our supporters to the printers who produce our quarterly newsletter. They also comply with the General Data Protection Regulation and use your details solely for the purpose of mailing the newsletter. They do not retain the data or use it for any other purpose.

It is your choice on the type of communications and information you receive about our charity and the ways in which you can get involved. You can change your mind at any time by contacting us by post, e-mail or phone using the contact details on page two of this newsletter. If you have a complaint about how your data is processed, please contact us in the first instance. If we cannot resolve the situation, you have the right to complain to the Information Commissioner's Office. You also have the right to request copies of any data held about you and to request rectification of any inaccuracies.
