Nader was born at our sanctuary in March to Hope, who was herself born at the sanctuary 5 years ago when her pregnant mother was rescued from the side of the road. Of course, we don't allow our donkeys to breed but as you may remember from a previous newsletter, a newly arrived male donkey got in with Hope before the vet arrived to castrate him and little Nader is the result. We will make sure this never happens again but all the staff and visitors absolutely adore this beautiful foal.



Saying Goodbye

As well as a "hello", we have also had a very sad "goodbye" since our last newsletter. Jordy was one of our earliest residents, having been with us since 2001, when he was rescued from a political demonstration where his ears and tail were brutally chopped off. Although he was understandably terrified of people when he arrived, over the years he grew into one of the friendliest donkeys at the sanctuary. Donkeys use their tails to flick off flies and as Jordy had no tail, the other donkeys used to stand in a circle around him and use theirs to make sure the flies didn't bother him. Sadly, Jordy suffered a terrible bout of colic and although our sanctuary vet Dr Eliran battled to save him, in the end the kindest thing was to put him peacefully to sleep. Rest in peace Jordy, you will never be forgotten.

We have also lost another member of our donkey family – Tzvika had been with us for just over 17 years but sadly, due to his teeth getting very bad, he was no longer able to chew and digest his food. He was losing weight and even specially mashed food didn't help him so eventually, the decision was taken to end his suffering.





Did you know? It takes 320 tons of hay a year to feed the donkeys at our sanctuary and each ton is about £238. That's over £76,000 just to feed the donkeys. Your donations literally put food in our donkeys' mouths – thank you so much for your support.



Dominic the indomitable







Dr Anna Harrison, our volunteer veterinary advisor writes...

1 July 2022 could have been just another day at Safe Haven, but it certainly wasn't. A desperate call about a young donkey colt in a bad way. Of course, the fabulous team rushed out but nothing prepared them for the sight of a thin, shivering youngster that veered between looking terrified and, even worse, just shutting down as if he'd given up.

Safely back at the sanctuary the vet was called and a deep bed with water and food easily available created for this little chap. The vet found his mouth was full of painful ulcers. To this day we do not know if it was some nasty disease process or maliciousness. Had someone tried to poison him? The problem here was that the pain was stopping him eating however hungry he was – even drinking was difficult. The vet did all he could with pain killers, antibiotics and intravenous fluids but where vetting stops vital nursing begins

This is what Tarek, Moussa and Ali excel at. They simply would not give up on this fragile soul, hand feeding with warm liquid feeds and warm water to drink. And they named him Dominic – he deserved a name even if he wasn't going to make it. It was touch and go for a few days despite day and night nursing. But on day 6 Dominic stood up on his own and the team cheered.



Severely underweight and small for his age (about 2) this brave wee chap started to blossom. Once out of his hospital bed area and declared free from any disease that could affect the herd, he was gradually introduced to the special needs donkey group in the hospital area. Donkeys being donkeys welcomed him quietly and gently and he slowly gained confidence and quickly gained an appetite!

Come the autumn it was time for him to experience paddock life but integration into the main herd required care as he would be joining fit and healthy donkeys, bordering on boisterous on a good day! And Dominic had known nothing but being cocooned in the special care unit with the oldies and receiving so much one-toone care. He was carefully observed in the first few days, and he did look a bit overwhelmed for a while, but this was a rite of passage we felt he had to go through and the happy ending would be if he stopped following the staff around, start talking to the donkeys and maybe find a special friend. This was a tough time for the team who just wanted to go and be with him when he would wait by the gate on his own, but Dominic got a bit braver with each passing day.

And now Dominic is in with the in crowd – putting weight on steadily, even a little bit taller and so much

more confident. He still loves people but is very happy mingling with his donkey chums and often to be seen mooching around with that king of the paddock group, our dear Burnie, so he chooses his friends wisely. Truly indomitable!

And so to the evening when Andy and I could sit on the decking area outside the cabins. We look out on a calm sea of donkeys at the far end of the paddock, enjoying the coolness of the evening after a strenuous day. Earlier we had walked in the neighbouring plantation and gathered fallen branches. Now was the time to scatter these in the paddock and the donkeys literally ran towards them, eagerly grabbing the branches, sometimes two donkeys playing tug of war with one branch and others starting to gnaw at them. Donkeys are natural browsers rather than grazers and love nothing more than to pick leaves, twigs and berries off trees and shrubs they come across in their natural habitat. This is a simple, free way to satisfy their behavioural need to browse and gnaw.

What a day! Our donkey family had had lots of excitement and it was wonderfully satisfying to bring something a little different to their day. Sanctuary life may be safe and secure but it should never be boring!

We may not be able to change the world for all donkeys, but this donkey's world has been transformed thanks to Safe Haven (and that, supporters, is each and every one of you!)

Greetings to all our wonderful supporters!

We are so happy that spring is now here and it will soon be summer – the weather is now warm and sunny after a cold and wet start to the year. The donkeys prefer the fine weather and so do the team and I!

After a period of unrest in the West Bank, particularly in the Nablus area which sometimes made it difficult for Nour, Wael and I to travel with the mobile clinic, I am pleased to say that as I write, things seem to be settling down again and we are back out on the road, helping as many animals as we can and providing support and advice to the owners who rely on them.

One very important and special piece of equipment that we use so very much is our new ultrasound machine and I would like to say a special thank you to Gerry and Shirley Robinson for donating the funds for this machine. It took some time to buy it and then have it shipped to the West Bank but finally it is here and being put to very good use to investigate wounds and tissues and to see whether mares might be pregnant.

As you know, in a previous newsletter we mentioned that we are looking for a new site for the 30 or so donkeys which currently live at the Nablus clinic. The

clinic was only ever meant as a hospital and really isn't big enough for so many donkeys, they need more space to run around and play. We think we may finally have found a site near the city of Jenin – I will update you in the next newsletter. Of course, they will have a dedicated person to take care of them and I will visit regularly as I am often in Jenin with the mobile clinic. We also hope to use the new site as a base to allow us to hold training sessions for children, donkey owners and veterinary students. Our dream is that one day, animal welfare will have improved so much in the West Bank that we will no longer be needed. Until that time, we will never stop doing all we can to help the donkeys.

And finally, I have some great news...

As you know, many parts of the West Bank are rural and much of our work is in remote towns and villages, sometimes even Bedouin camps. It is difficult for Nour, Wael and I to cover the whole country alone and as you know, in 2021, we expanded our mobile services to include a second clinic run by Dr Eyed Nasser with farrier Ahmad. This clinic covers the southern part of the West Bank – including the cities of Hebron, Bethlehem and the surrounding area.

As well as running the clinics in Nablus, I also cover the northern part of the West Bank with the main mobile clinic, but there are also many donkeys in the Jordan Valley area of the West Bank needing help.

I am delighted to be able to let you know that thanks entirely to your support, we are now able to run a third mobile clinic, led by Dr Omran and farrier Ali. After coming to Nablus for some specialist training with our team, Dr Omran and Ali are now hard at work helping dozens of donkeys, mules and horses (and even the occasional camel, sheep or goat) every week.

Of course, three mobile clinics means three lots of equipment and we are so very grateful to everyone who supported us last year by contributing towards the items our clinics need and to all those who donate towards the charity's work generally. Thank you all for helping to change animals' lives!

DATA PROTECTION & PRIVACY

In carrying out our day to day activities Safe Haven for Donkeys in the Holy Land processes and stores personal information relating to our supporters and we are therefore required to adhere to the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation and other relevant Acts and Regulations. We take our responsibilities very seriously and we ensure the personal information we obtain is held, used, transferred and otherwise processed in accordance with that Regulation and all other applicable data protection laws and regulations including, but not limited to, the Privacy and Electronic Communication Regulations.

Personal information we might collect includes your name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, date of birth, whether you are a tax payer (for Gift Aid purposes), bank account details if you set up a regular payment, donations you have made or events in which you have participated. On occasion, we may need to look up your telephone number in the phone book to contact you regarding a donation you have made – we would then store this data in our database in case it is needed for the same purpose in the future.

We collect this data for purposes including the processing of any donation made by you, to provide you with any products or information you have requested or for internal record keeping/accounting/administration. Having supported us, under the "legitimate interest" condition for processing data we believe that you would like to receive our quarterly newsletter and occasional additional appeals or updates on our work and so we will also use your details for this purpose.

If you use your credit or debit card to donate to us, buy something or pay online or over the phone, we will ensure that this is done securely and in accordance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard. All card details and validation codes are securely destroyed once the payment or donation has been processed. Other information will be held as long as is reasonably necessary to allow us to continue to communicate with you or to comply with relevant legislation. For example, the HMRC require Gift Aid declarations to be retained indefinitely.

We will not sell, share or swap your information with any third parties unless required to do so for legal reasons (for example to the police). We do send the names and addresses of our supporters to the printers who produce our quarterly newsletter. They also comply with the General Data Protection Regulation and use your details solely for the purpose of mailing the newsletter. They do not retain the data or use it for any other purpose.

It is your choice on the type of communications and information you receive about our charity and the ways in which you can get involved. You can change your mind at any time by contacting us by post, e-mail or phone using the contact details on page two of this newsletter. If you have a complaint about how your data is processed, please contact us in the first instance. If we cannot resolve the situation, you have the right to complain to the Information Commissioner's Office. You also have the right to request copies of any data held about you and to request rectification of any inaccuracies.
